Leicester Grammar School Trust

Leicester Grammar School Trust (LGST) is a forward-thinking family of schools, underpinned by a strong sense of values. Its mission is to be an inspiring centre for co-educational excellence in academic and personal development, within a Christian ethos. We attract and encourage enthusiastic, dedicated and innovative teachers and support staff who all contribute to our pupils' progress and happiness.

At the heart of the Trust is Leicester Grammar School, founded in 1981 in response to the demise of the maintained grammar schools in the area. The Junior School was added in 1992, which broadened the educational offering of the Trust. The defining milestone in the Trust's development was the bold and inspired decision in the mid-2000s to move the two schools from the heart of Leicester to the edge of Great Glen, a rural village some seven miles to the south of the city. Since September 2008, the two schools have occupied a very attractive, 75-acre campus, which was officially opened by Queen Elizabeth II.

The acquisition of nearby Stoneygate School in 2016 has brought a third educational institution under the umbrella of the Trust, offering greater choice to parents in Leicestershire and surrounding areas who seek an independent education for their children. In September 2021, Stoneygate was relaunched as LGS Stoneygate, with its own unique ethos and identity within the Trust's family of schools.

Situated on the outskirts of one of the most multicultural cities in the UK, all three LGST schools are proud to draw children from city and country, and to welcome pupils and staff from a rich range of cultural and religious backgrounds.

Leicester Grammar School

Leicester Grammar School won the accolade of Sunday Times East Midlands Independent Secondary School of the Year 2020, and in the most recent Independent Schools Inspection (December 2019), achieved the highest possible grade of Excellent' in both categories: Pupils' Academic and Other Achievements; and Pupils' Personal Development.

Our pupils enjoy exceptional opportunities within and beyond the classroom; we have high expectations, but the success of our community stems above all from a culture of aspiration and care.

The school, indeed the Trust as a whole, is financially strong and led by a very committed senior team and an open, collaborative and well-qualified Board of fourteen local Trustees. We attract positive, polite and 'grounded' children, who display a strong sense of respect for one another and for staff. Concerns over behaviour are rare; our pupils thrive in a calm and purposeful community, well supported and guided by staff.

Examination results in 2019 (the last year of external results) were typically excellent, with over 50% of A levels graded A*/A and 81% A*-B. At GCSE, a very impressive 57% of grades were at 9/8/A* and the school was ranked 19th coeducational independent school nationally in the Times. Eight students have recently accepted Oxbridge places for 2021 entry.

The school has excellent local transport links, with both London and Birmingham under an hour away by train. The school is nestled in the glorious countryside of the East Midlands with many beautiful villages in the surrounding area. The market town of Market Harborough, situated 10 miles to the south of Great Glen, offers a strong sense of community and regularly features in the top 10 of lists such as the Most Liveable Place in England' and the Sunday Times Best Places to Live'.

The school's aims are to:

- Promote intellectual curiosity and academic excellence.
- Provide a broad, balanced and stimulating curriculum.
- Offer a rich range of co-curricular opportunities which enhance pupils' physical, cultural and personal development.
- Equip pupils with the self-belief, consideration and skills required for a principled and fulfilling life.
- Create a happy and mutually-supportive community of learners and staff, in which each individual is encouraged and enabled to do and be their best.
- Care for the mental and emotional well-being of pupils, and be proactive in the promotion of a healthy lifestyle.
- Welcome pupils of diverse backgrounds and faiths, nurturing their social and spiritual development.
- Foster a generous contribution to charity, community service and society.



Campus and Facilities

The new-build scheme, completed in 2008, completed in 2008, provided the Grammar School and the Junior School, housed in the same building, with excellent facilities, outstanding equipment and a beautiful and practical space in which to learn and work together.

Accessed from the main entrance foyer of the Grammar School is St Nicholas' Hall which seats 900 and hosts assemblies, chapel services, school concerts and outside performances. An extension was added in 2015, providing additional science and lecture facilities, meeting and office space and an enhanced Sixth Form common room.

In addition, there is an indoor sports complex which offers multi-use courts for Badminton, Basketball and Netball. Indoor Cricket nets and Table Tennis are available, along with a well-equipped and supervised fitness suite, a Gym/Dance Studio and a 25-metre, 6-lane, heated swimming pool. With 75 acres of land, including several full-sized rugby pitches, cricket pitches and nets, two all-weather artificial hockey pitches, eight floodlit hard tennis and netball courts, it is no wonder that the site has been used as a team training base for numerous national teams, including the Canadian rugby team and the West Indies Ladies' Cricket teams.



Welcome to the Design and Technology Department

The Design and Technology Department is vibrant and well-established within Leicester Grammar School. All pupils from Year 6 to Year 8 have DT lessons within their timetables and pupils can opt to study it further at Year 9, GCSE and A level. The subject is popular, with those pupils who study the subject at A Level going on to study design-based or engineering degrees at university. We believe giving pupils the opportunity to study all material areas gives them the skills required to achieve well in their exams and NEA. There are two recently refurbished workshops which are well equipped, offering a wide range of processes for timbers, metals and plastics, and a dedicated CADCAM suite with laser cutter, 3D printers, and vinyl cutters. Textiles and Food also come under the umbrella of DT where we have a Textiles room with Bernina sewing machines and a Food and Nutrition room.

Staffing

The successful candidate will be joining a hardworking and friendly team. There are three full-time and four part-time teachers who are all supported by our knowledgeable technicians.

Lower School Courses

Year 6: Carousel arrangement covering DT/Food/Textiles, plus a two-day Technology Challenge during exam week.

Year 7: Carousel arrangement covering Food/Textiles, and DT all year.

Year 8: Carousel arrangement covering Food/Textiles/CADCAM and DT

Year 9: DT and Food are put into the options system so that pupils can choose to take a subject for the whole year.



Exam Courses

We currently have 7 GCSE groups following the AQA Design and Technology specification and are on track to have 3 A Level groups who also study the AQA Product Design Course. Pupils opting for Food and Nutrition study the IGCSE. Group sizes are consistently kept to a maximum of 12, giving teachers plenty of time to support their pupils in the development of their practical skills.

Co-curricular Activities

Pupils love Design and Technology and are keen to get involved in the many co-curricular opportunities available. Prep and Junior school pupils take part in a two day 'Technology challenge' where they are tasked to solve an engineering problem. These have ranged from wind/elastic band-powered vehicles, ballistas and rockets to ping-pong ball launchers and bridge building. Annually, we host the Rotary Club Technology Challenge - a day of problem-solving activities for groups from Year 8 – Year 13 against competing schools in the local area. This year our pupils excelled themselves and won all three categories.

In Year 11, pupils may be entered for the Arkwright Scholarship which offers financial support during Years 12 and 13, along with opportunities for work experience in prestigious engineering companies.

We also compete in the Greenpower Electric Powered Racecar competition where pupils from Year 9 – 12 race their cars at race circuits across the UK. Goodwood and Dunfold (Top Gear test track!) are on our list for this year, but we have visited many others in previous years.

The workshops are open most lunchtimes for pupils to complete practical work started in lessons. This particularly applies to GCSE and A Level pupils who wish to further develop their final outcomes for their NEA.

We believe that trips are an excellent way to enthuse pupils and see theory applications in action. In previous years, we have visited the BMW Mini factory, Jaguar Landrover, JCB, DMU degree show, and are always keen to see what other visits will excite pupils about our incredible subject.

The Post

We are looking for an inspirational teacher to join our highly successful Design & Technology (DT) Department from September 2023.

The role is offered as part-time or full-time (0.8 to 1.0).

The successful candidate will ideally demonstrate strength and experience with teaching DT up to A-Level. You would also contribute fully to the pastoral and co-curricular life of the DT department and Leicester Grammar School generally.

We are happy to consider both experienced candidates and those who are at an early stage of their career. For the right candidate, this post might also suit a well-qualified graduate who is considering training to become a teacher with the school's support, via the University of Buckingham PGCE.

We welcome applications from all sectors of the community as we aspire to attract staff who reflect the social and cultural diversity of our pupil intake. We consider the most important factor to be the right skills, abilities and aptitude for the role which will ultimately improve the well-being and education of our pupils. Applicants must have the right to work in the UK.

Purpose of the job:

A teacher at Leicester Grammar School contributes to the well-being and development of the school by supervising, guiding and caring for pupils inside and outside the classroom. Teachers are responsible to the appropriate Head of Department, and expected to:

- teach within the agreed departmental scheme of work and follow agreed whole school policies on such matters as reports, marking and assessing and monitoring pupils' work and progress
- attend departmental meetings and INSET days, as well as whole school Staff Meetings as indicated by the Headmaster
- exercise proper care of rooms and equipment and follow the school's policy on Health and Safety matters.

While the first priority of a subject teacher is the teaching of their subject specialism including preparation, marking, assessing and evaluation of the success or failure of any period of teaching - it is expected that a subject teacher will:

- attempt to improve qualifications and expertise and keep up-to-date with subject material and exam requirements, as is necessary and practicable
- participate in the various co-curricular activities offered at Leicester Grammar School as own interests allow
- become involved in the Tutor, Pastoral and House systems currently inoperation in the school.

Key Responsibilities

- Plan, deliver and assess appropriate lessons which ensure that the potential of all pupils is fulfilled
- Contribute positively and accept delegation, with department colleagues, to the production, implementation and evaluation of department Schemes of Work and resources
- Encourage pupils by regular marking, advising constructively by using targets and giving appropriate praise
- Be aware of individual pupils' needs, whether they are academic or social, and liaise with pastoral and well-being team where necessary
- Perform the role of Form Tutor and deliver Personal Social and Health Education
- Monitor assessment through use of data and target setting, and to maintain records of assessments of the students and levels of attainment as laid out in the National Curriculum, where appropriate
- Ensure equality of pupils regardless of ability, age, class, culture, disability, faith, gender, race or sexual identity
- Promote high standards for all pupils and maintaining high expectations both in and out of lessons
- Provide a positive environment where effective teaching and learning can take place and create opportunities for pupils to develop wider skills for later life

- Communicate effectively and be willing to develop and share good practice with colleagues, in meetings and through lesson observations
- Be committed to the demands of a high achieving school, both in the classroom and beyond
- Remain familiar with national and local initiatives within the subject area and focus on own professional development to the benefit of pupils
- Attend meetings and Parents' Evenings scheduled in the School Calendar
- Ensure that the school's Health and Safety policy is implemented
- Support and contribute to the school's responsibility for safeguarding pupils
- Lead and conduct oneself in an exemplary manner from a child protection point of view.

- Use excellent organisational skills and interpersonal and communication
- skills to manage own workload and build relationships

- Possess excellent time management and organisational skills
- Demonstrate the ability to follow instructions, policies and procedures.

- Good ICT skills, and the willingness and ability to learn new systems, as required by the post

- Have an understanding of safeguarding.
